Terms

Price

The amount child care providers charge privately-paying families. The price is often set based on the child care market and what parents can afford.



Cost

The value of all resources required to deliver child care services, including salaries, rent, utilities, equipment, insurance, supplies, and other personnel and non-personnel expenses.

Why Does Using Cost Data to Set Rates Matter?

- Price does not reflect the cost of providing care.
- It can ensure that child care programs have the funds needed to provide basic health, safety, and staffing.
- It provides an incentive for more child care programs to enroll children receiving subsidy.

- Setting rates based only on price can perpetuate the underfunding of child care.
- It can ensure that child care programs can cover the cost of increasing quality care.
- It moves parents toward having equal access and reduces barriers.

Cost data can help break the cycle of low wages and low compensation.





Cost data helps us answer questions about child care systems and policies!



Data you regularly collect or have from studies, or data recently gathered from child care providers.

Existing Data Assumptions Number of scenarios Quality levels 000 Cost Model

Data from Providers

- Salaries
- Ratios and group size
- Type of care
- Location
- Size




