Do you have the right partners at the table?

Internal experts

Policymakers

Fiscal staff — budget and projections

Analysts — reports and data

Program staff — policy and procedures

Legislative liaison







Defining a Plan for Combining Funds



Communicate the decision to all relevant parties:

Make sure everyone involved, from team members to stakeholders, knows the chosen course of action.



Set goals and expectations:

Establish both short-term and long-term objectives to monitor progress and determine whether the chosen path is effective.



Create an implementation timeframe:

Outline the sequence of tasks and establish deadlines for each step.





Working the Plan



Delegate responsibilities and provide resources:

Assign tasks to team members based on their expertise and provide the necessary tools, training, and support to help them succeed.



Monitor progress and make adjustments as needed:

Regularly review your team's progress and be open to making changes if something isn't working.


Combining Funds to Strengthen Child Care

An effective way to stretch resources and serve additional children and families

Lead Agencies and administrators should understand the:












Braided



- Funds coordinated
- Costs allocated

Blended



- Funds combined to cover costs
- Costs likely not allocated

Layered



- Line-item costs assigned to distinct funds
- These may or may not be allocated



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



Core Child Care Services

Costs covered with child care subsidy
*Early Head Start-Child Care (EHS-CC) partnership funds may be

used in the case of an EHS-enrolled child if subsidy is lost, insufficient, or unavailable.

Program Level Enhancements

Costs covered with EHS-CC partnership funds

*Enhancements to support comprehensive services

Individual Child Services

EHS enrolled: EHS-CC partnership funds

*Use other sources of funds for non-EHS enrolled children

Funding Sources Commonly Combined with CCDF



Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)



Social Services Block Grant (SSBG)



State funds including preschool



Other Funding Sources:

- USDA Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)
- IDEA Part B and C
- Title I public school monies
- Title IV-E foster care







TANF 2023 by the Numbers



\$26.1 billion

in total TANF funds in grant year 2023





\$9.288 billion in carryover from the previous fiscal year

States transferred nearly 13% of the allowed 30%







TANF 2023 by the Numbers



Two states

maximized the TANF transfer of 30% to CCDF.




29 states and D.C.

used TANF to directly support child care assistance.



24 states

reported no TANF transfer to CCDF.



13 of those states

used TANF for direct child care assistance.
